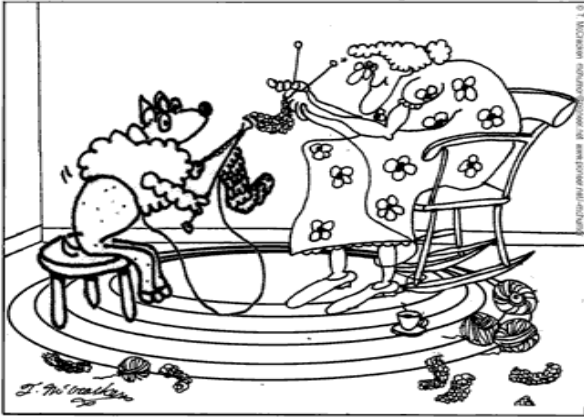

Winter work on Ashdown Forest

In mid-September, Forest staff began this year's round of heathland restoration work in the St Johns area. They will spend most of the winter clearing invasive birch and oak scrub which is threatening to overwhelm the heath. Our own staff will be joined by outside contractors who will do the same work in other areas across the Forest. The locations of heathland restoration areas can be found on the website.

If members of the public question the need for tree and scrub removal, it is important to remind them of the wildlife interest of heathland, which will be lost if more woodland is allowed to develop. If they are not convinced by a conservation argument, they may be persuaded that the unique Forest landscape, with wide views across the Weald and Downs, can only be maintained by controlling the spread of invasive birch scrub. The Conservators aim to maintain and protect some 1500 hectares of heathland and woodland.

The Ashdown Forest Bird Group



The Group continues to monitor many areas of the Forest, and though we have not yet been able to analyse all the records, a rough estimate indicates that **woodlarks** are increasing in number. There were sixteen records of singing males this year, compared with ten last year. Sadly, the general feeling is that **stonechat** numbers are down. **Dartford warblers** seem to be increasing, as do **yellowhammers**. There were plenty of **chiffchaffs**, though fewer **willow warblers**, **reed buntings**, and **tree pipits**, were noted. **Spotted flycatchers** were few and far between, as always. **Turtle doves** were heard in six areas, with confirmed breeding in one.

Breeding records for **nightjars** are hard to come by - but the Group did arrange two nightjar walks, for the S.O.S., and for the Friends, around the Airstrip. We also covered sixteen other sites, on at least one occasion getting thoroughly soaked! **Woodcock** and **tawny owl** were counted, too.

Highlights this year included two **red kites** over Garden of Eden, a fabulous **wood warbler** singing near the Forest Centre, three **buzzard** families, and a **hobby** pair with two young.

Wood Permits 2008-2009

The wood cutting season begins on 1 November and as usual those requiring a wood permit should contact the office with their name, address, telephone number and location. As usual the Chase Ranger will arrange a meeting and show where and what may be cut. A chain-saw will probably be required as will a copy of the public liability section of the household insurance. As usual all wood must be removed from the Forest by March. Wood for non-commoners will be £25.00 this year. Please direct all queries to the office.

Conservation Group

The summer has passed with little activity by the Conservation Group - our end of month meeting dates coinciding with Bank Holidays weekends and, of course, our own holidays too. So, it's time to roll up our sleeves and think of the months ahead. A priority will continue to be the control of rhododendron. Over the last three years we have got on top of it in Tabell Ghyll (about a mile east of here) and finished it off inside the Woodland Garden at Chelwood Vachery. Just outside the Garden, however, we only managed to make a start (but a good one!) last winter and there we'll carry on.

It's not just with hand tools that we've been clearing rhododendron. Our cutting is followed up by treatment that shrivels the leaves and eventually kills the roots. Funding from the Forestry Commission has helped us with this and with the use of contractors to clear the bigger bushes with machinery. Dare I say that the end is in sight for rhododendron? I look forward to seeing you again - 1015 or so in the Centre car park on the last Sunday of each month.

SCHOOL VISITS TO ASHDOWN FOREST



Earlier this year education on Ashdown Forest was taken on by Sussex Wildlife Trust. The options available are primarily aimed at key stage 1 & 2 children, but can be modified to meet the needs of older groups. So far just over 400 children have visited the Forest on a 'Discovering Ashdown Forest' day where they have enjoyed activities designed to help them appreciate the sounds and sights of the landscape. **Mirror walk** - 'fly' through the woodland, experiencing what it is like to be high in the tree canopy, finding out about how the trees survive and the wildlife they support. **Heathland identification** - looking at the colours within the heathland and learning to identify some common heathland plant species and finding out about basic heathland management. **Trees** - simple methods for estimating the age of a tree. **Journey cards** - looking at contrasting habitats along part of the route. Schools can book the 'Explorer Packs', rucksacks containing items such as sweep nets, parachutes, field guides and art equipment.
